

Good friends handle conflict respectfully and respect boundaries	A good friend will tell you if you've done something to hurt them. If you tell a good friend they've hurt you, they'll be sorry and won't do it again.
Friends not followers	In the digital world you can feel under pressure to have a lot of friends and followers. Remember that you only need a small circle of friends to be happy,



## Task 2: Social Engineering

Viruses: Programs which can self-replicate and		
are designed to infect software programs or		
systems.		
Phishing: Untargeted, mass emails sent to many		
people, asking for sensitive information (such as		
bank details) or encouraging them to visit a fake		
website through a link. This could also be through		
social media messages. For example, someone		
might click on a fake advert and enter their		
details (credential harvesting).		
Blagging: When someone makes up a story to		
gain a person's interest and engage them in		
communication, often via email.		
Malware: Malicious software - this includes		
viruses or any code or content that could have a		
negative impact on organisations or individuals.		
Pharming: When a user is redirected from a		
genuine website to a fake one because of		
malware on their device.		
Shouldering/Shoulder surfing: Looking at		
someone's information over their shoulder, for		
example whilst they are entering a pin.		
Spear-phishing: A more targeted form of		
phishing, where the email is designed to look like		
it's from a person the recipient knows and/or		
trusts.		
Malvertising: Using online advertising as a		
delivery method for malware.		
Smishing: Phishing via SMS - text messages are		
sent to users, asking for sensitive information		
(e.g. bank details) or encouraging them to visit a		
fake website.		
Ransomware: Malicious software that makes data		
or systems unusable until the victim makes a		
payment.		
Spyware: A type of malware that infects a PC or		
device and gathers information about the user,		
including online activity, usernames and		
passwords, payment information, and emails.		



Whaling: Highly targeted phishing attacks (which	
look like legitimate emails) that are aimed at	
senior executives.
